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Overview of the ESSA Landscape

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The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) has created a unique challenge for states, districts, schools, administrators and educators throughout the American education system.

The 2015 legislation charges each state with the responsibility of developing its own education plans within a federal framework. On one hand, there's freedom in having more flexibility and autonomy. On the other, it's tough to design an education plan from scratch that fits all students in all districts—and hits all the benchmarks.

[ESSA] gives states significant new leeway to set student achievement goals and calls for looking beyond test scores in gauging school performance.

Measuring Success

ESSA differs from prior acts. While states remain responsible for holding their schools accountable for student achievement, they've gained autonomy in defining and measuring success. ESSA's measurement framework contains four compulsory indicators, plus at least one more chosen at the state's discretion (for a minimum of five). The required measures are:



Academic achievement in reading and math



Student progress or growth in reading and math



Four-year high school graduation rates (with the option to include extended-year rates)



Progress toward English language proficiency

The flexible part of the plan focuses on at least one additional indicator, a measure of school quality or student success. States also have the option to include multiple measures within an indicator. ESSA suggestions for additional indicators include:



A lot of districts have chosen to focus on college and career readiness. Why? When done well, its chief outcome of providing all students with a personalized plan for success has a tendency to extend into other areas of ESSA mandates. Things like student engagement, academic achievement, and graduation rates can all rise when students see the purpose in what they're learning and have a plan. But what measures are the best to gauge college and career readiness?

Forty-nine states have included at least one strategy to expand career readiness in their ESSA plans.

Key Challenges for Districts

Key Challenges for Districts

With state plans approved and underway for the 2018/19 school year, districts have a general understanding of what is required of them under ESSA's framework. But the path to compliance has not been cleared. As the pioneers of this new system, districts face a number of challenges, including:





Skills and resources

A new education plan calls for new ideas and approaches. Administrators and educators may require consultations, professional development opportunities, and access to tools to help design and implement new programs that meet ESSA mandates.



Implementing new systems inevitably comes with new costs. Funding is available to upgrade programs to improve school achievement and provide highquality professional learning for administrators and teachers, but it may be onerous to seek out and secure.



Disparity in student and school needs

The needs of individual students inevitably differ, sometimes widely, between schools. But ESSA compliance, at its highest level, demands uniform outcomes. This sets up a push and pull between trying to deliver personalized outcomes for students while maintaining a consistent framework for measurement and execution across schools and districts..

The founding principle of ESSA was that states, unbound by federal oversight, would develop stronger, more creative education systems that in the end would better serve students and increase equity. The law was intended to act as a floor upon which states would build compelling and innovative systems.



Combats Absenteeism

According to non-profit public policy organization <u>The Brookings Institution</u>, "during the 2015-16 school year, one out of every four students attended school with high or extreme levels of chronic absence, and nearly 8 million students (15 percent) in the nation were chronically absent."

The problem is so pervasive that ESSA requires all schools to report absenteeism on report cards and many states have made it a school accountability metric in their education plans. <u>There are many reasons</u> that contribute to absenteeism, but academic disengagement is a big one.

The right career planning program can create a route forward to a life beyond the confines of school for disengaged students. With an attainable career in mind and clear pathway to get there, at-risk students can see how they may build a future based on their aptitudes and interests. They'll learn what they need to do to reach their goals, which invariably includes attending school to earn required credits. A more defined plan may lead them to take specialized courses that align with their interests, further improving their engagement and performance.

Offers Consistency and Provides Measurable Data Across the District

It's easier to measure school and student performance when the entire district uses the same career planning program. With access to the same assessments, content, lessons, and standards, administrators can be assured that every student has equal opportunity, regardless of background or ability, to plan their post-secondary future.

On the whole, an effective program also allows administrators to track and measure every student's progress towards graduation. The best programs go one step further, proactively flagging when a student is off track so that educators can swiftly intervene and focus on anyone who needs extra support. Features of this nature helps educators channel their very limited time (and depleted energy) into where they can make the biggest difference.

Room to Reflect



Any solution worth considering needs to mesh with students' expectations for how technology needs to work in their lives. According to Marketing Tech News, "Generation Z is engaging with 10 hours of online content a day". With this in mind, mobile access provides the ability to strike when the iron is hot, allowing students to login, research and reflect on options whenever inspiration strikes.

Builds Real-World Skills

Communication, relationship building, problem solving, time management, and other transferable, nontechnical skills are what give 21st-century job seekers an edge over their competitors. According to the <u>Strada-Gallup 2017 College Student Survey</u> – which represents the views of more than 30,000 randomly selected college students across 43 randomly selected institutions – while nearly 80% of students considered their oral/written communication skills proficient, less than 42% of employers felt this way about recent hires. Lessons that introduce these concepts, including increasingly vital financial literacy, help prepare students to meet the challenges of successfully building a career while taking on the adult responsibilities that go with it.

Supports Course Planning and Specializations

Look for functionality that enables students to build four-year course plans that meet diploma requirements and help students align their course load to their interests. In addition, look for features that track progress and recommend courses for specific pathways and graduation requirements. To help students stay on track, ensure that they can log in any time to view their progress and determine whether their course selections qualify them to graduate with a specialization or other special designations they require.

Easily Shareable

The home-to-school connection is an important contributor to student success. With access to view their child's long-term goals, including colleges, majors, and careers of interest, parents and guardians can offer valuable and relevant guidance and ensure their advice and support is in line with their child's plans for the future. And at school, educators can have more productive meetings with students as they review profiles together.

Streamlines College Exploration and Application Processes

To help students choose a college that will be a good fit for their needs and preferences. Look for a program that differentiate colleges with robust, up-to-date profiles that include program details and admission requirements, as well as information on campus setting, nearby amenities, demographics, expected costs and expenses, extracurriculars, and financial aid options.

Once students decide which colleges to apply to, you'll want a system that facilitates requests and securely delivers electronic transcripts on their behalf, and keeps their documents organized and visible. A strong program allows students to easily submit transcript requests and administrators to quickly approve and send.

Accessible for All

Successful futures are for everyone. Many programs tout accessibility, but look carefully because not all truly comply. Seek a program that delivers an experience that meets WCAG 2.0 (Level AA) standards with full keyboard, screen reader, and low-vision accessibility.



Safe and Secure

Cloud-based software allows users to access the application and its data from anywhere, anytime. Such access naturally poses security concerns. Keeping students' data, records and personal information private and secure is not only critical, it's the law. Look for a partner that has rock solid privacy protocols and breach prevention controls at all levels of the company. Prevention starts on the front line so they should have regular security awareness training. They also need to be reviewing their privacy policies frequently. Best-in-class vendors go the extra mile. They set up prevention controls like automatic backups, firewalls, intrusion detection systems, and even annual third-party vulnerability scans and assessments.

Case Study: The Wenatchee School District and Xello

When it came to preparing students for college and career planning, Mike Wilson knew the state-provided software wasn't cutting it. As a long-time educator, he knew something was missing.

This is Mike's story...

Q: When did you realize that what your district had in place wasn't the best solution?

A: When I looked at our state-created software options, I realized they weren't quite fitting the bill for our vision of what college and career readiness meant. We wanted a platform that was more robust and would actually help students see the big picture—all connected together.

Our vision was to expand students' horizons and show them everything that might be possible for their future, getting them energized about the future and able to picture what academic and career success actually looks like for them.

Q: How did you go about figuring out what you'd need to achieve these goals?

A: We started by thinking about what success for our students really looked like and getting everyone aligned on our vision. I came up with a list of categories and boxes that we wanted to ensure we checked based on what we felt our students really needed to be ready to succeed in the real world.

There were also some guidelines from our department of education. For example, in the state of Washington, we have the High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP). It details the graduation requirements for every student in the state. So we looked at that, too, and what it would mean to fulfill that mandate. We wanted something that was simple to use but that also provided powerful information for both students and educators—something that everyone was excited to use!

Case Study: The Wenatchee School District and Xello

Q: What changes have you seen in your students after bringing on the Xello program?

A: It's like a lightbulb went on [for our students] and they're now able to see how everything relates. They're more self-aware. They're able to link together how things like personality, likes, dislikes, skills, interests—all the stuff that makes up who they are—connect with careers and schooling.

It's really helped make course planning more meaningful. For instance, if a student is interested in becoming an electrician, they can now see what training and skills they need to do that job. They then better understand why they would need to study something like physics or trigonometry. It's a crystal ball into their future. We get a lot less of the "When will I ever use this?" type questions because students know how it's relevant.

And students are more engaged. I actually have to tell students to log out when the bell rings. It's not difficult anymore to keep students on task, which just makes our lives so much easier and is really rewarding to see.

Q: What benefits have you experienced at the administrative or educator level?

A: Apart from knowing that we're giving the students something better to work with, the biggest benefit for us was the ability to meet the High School and Beyond Plan requirements. With just one piece of software, we've been able to ensure that we can meet that requirement because it spans both middle school and high school students. We actually were able to get ahead of the curve with it.

We had an out-of-the-box solution to help guide the students' Personalized Pathway Requirement. It's been a win-win for us—good for students, good for us.

How to Never Make a Bad Online Software Purchase Decision

Selecting a college and career readiness solution for a school or district is a huge decision. You want to engage and inspire students, empower educators, and be respectful of the budget. Here are some best practices to keep in mind as you begin the purchasing process.

Assemble a Buying Team

Bring together a number of professionals in different roles who can offer a broader perspective than a single stakeholder. Roles may include:

- Executive sponsor: Ensures outcomes align with state and district mandates. May also advise on budget and funding availability.
- Curriculum and mandate expert: Examines how all embedded lessons and activities in the program align with required grade-level outcomes for post-secondary planning.
- **Counselor:** Validates a solution's alignment with college and career planning methodologies, especially graduation requirements.
- **CTE specialist:** Ensures adequate options and guidance for students who are pursuing technical specializations and career options.
- **IT analyst:** Validates all technical implementation and operating considerations, including ease of integration, system resiliency, security, data migration, and management needs.

Work to Find the Best Price

Many software-as-a-service (SaaS) solutions offer a flat-rate subscription price. Buyers often find out about hidden service fees after they've signed the contract. Look for service providers that have a transparent pricing structure. They do exist!

You can also avoid the hidden-cost trap by asking companies to break down all fees to a price-per-student line item. Be sure they include training and implementation costs, data migration and activation, and costs for non-standard modules. It's helpful to add a margin of error for unforeseen costs and challenges.

Look for the Best Value

Cost isn't everything. While two or more products might meet the same general requirements at different prices, there may be huge gaps in the experience they provide. One option may save you money, but deliver an inferior student experience. When the Wenatchee School District shopped for a solution that was right for them, they put price in perspective by evaluating other factors as well.

The added cost actually felt really minimal for the value we would be getting in return—both in terms of student engagement and based on the expected improvements in student retention and achievement. When we started looking at things based on value, it became a pretty easy decision.

Make the Most of Demos

Most solutions offer demonstration log-ins that allow administrators and educators to explore all features and get a feel for the true user experience. It's important that the entire buying team spends time with each solution before delivering their recommendations on which one to purchase. It's also helpful to bring in additional educators and some students of varying engagement levels to try the options out and report on their preferences.

Evaluate ESSA Compliance

The solution you choose should be a tool that helps you meet your state mandates. Take special care to evaluate how each option measures up to compliance requirements. Ask the vendor's sales staff to show you how their system aligns with your curriculum and education plan mandates. Check that any associated compliance reporting processes are easy to use and make it simple for educators to access, run, and share.

Ensure Good Service and Support

Even the best solutions don't always work perfectly right out of the box. Probe the vendor's sales team about their approach to service and support. Ask:



Do you provide a personalized plan complete with defined program goals?



How extensive is onboarding training?

Are you available for regular check-in calls and advice for things like measuring program usage and tracking outcomes? Is there an online knowledge base for quick troubleshooting?

Is there after-hours help available?

Who do we call if we need more personalized assistance?
